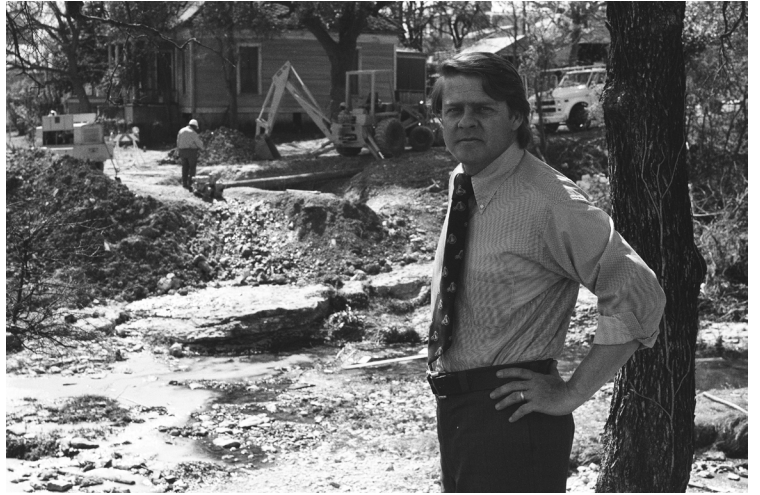

Stuart practiced environmental law in Austin for 40 years, and was a force to be reckoned with. He was a champion for land, water and wildlife. His dedication and hard work laid the groundwork for water conservation and wildlife protection that inspired many young lawyers to fight the good fight on behalf of Mother Earth. He played a critical role in protecting water in Texas: the Director of the City's first Environmental Office of Resource Management, a founder and Chairman of the Board of Save Our Springs, a staunch advocate and voice of the Sierra Club, and much more. He led the federal lawsuit to protect Edwards Aquifer and won. His positive impact lives on through Texas water policy and in those he mentored and inspired. The Texas environment and many individuals are better off for Stuart's devotion, talent and passion.

Stuart was a man of strength, honor and integrity. You always knew where you stood with him. His boisterous personality and dauntless spirit is what he will be remembered for, both personally and professionally. He worked tirelessly, whether it be on important environmental issues or projects in Dripping Springs.
